Expanding Local Ministry Opportunities

As a staff, we are always trying to seek ways in which to expand the ministry of Great Oaks Camp. One of the ways that God is directing us is in the area of local ministry. Last year, Great Oaks offered the opportunity for over 150 students from Midland Middle School to come and experience the Adventure Challenge Course for free. We are planning to provide the same experience this year, as well.

Jim has begun the process of partnering with the High School counselor at Midland to create a Leadership Program, led by Great Oaks; it will focus on reaching those students who don't qualify for the present, school-based Leadership Program offered at Midland High School. Jim's hope is to meet twice a month, once at school and once at camp, to help these students develop leadership skills through leading and facilitating on the Adventure Challenge Course. By the end of the program, Jim's desire is for the students to develop enough confidence and competency to lead a group of their own peers, as they participate on the Adventure Challenge Course.

Another way in which we have been able to reach out to local kids is through our Adventure Camp. We had 10 campers from the local area attend. Great Oaks Camp plans to continue creating more opportunities to reach out to our local community by connecting people to Jesus through life changing experiences.
